

## THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

On the first Sunday of May at all our Benefice Churches the congregations were given a copy of the Archbishops' Pastoral Letter to the Parishes and Chaplaincies of the Church of England for the General Election. Towards the end of the Letter it reads *'religious belief is the well-spring for the virtues and practices that make for good individuals, strong relationships and flourishing communities. In Britain, these embedded virtues are not unique to Christians, but they have their roots in the Christian history of our four nations'*. The same Sunday at St Gregory's Minster, the Service included 'a Litany of Remembrance of Founders and Benefactors' with a reference to the Northern Saints – Aidan, Cuthbert, Cedd and Chad, Hilda and Bede. This caused me to ponder on the election promise of new bank holidays possibly to celebrate the patron saints of the four nations that make up the UK, putting the spotlight on a colourful quartet of figures from church history. St George, whose emblem provides the solid red cross at the heart of the Union Jack is thought to have been a Roman soldier of Syrian origin martyred in Palestine in the 3rd century. He became a heroic military saint associated with the values of chivalry and his cult was brought back by English soldiers fighting in the Crusades of the 12th century. St Andrew also of Middle Eastern origin is best known as one of Jesus's first disciples. His cult was taken up by the Picts in eastern Scotland in the late 8th century and early 9th centuries to counter claims for the Gaelic St Columba to be patron of the emerging Scottish nation. It was largely through adoption by the monarchy and church establishment that the figure of Andrew, martyred on the diagonal cross that is the dominant symbol of the Scottish national flag, the Saltire, and also prominent on the Union Jack, became the Scottish patron saint. St Patrick was born in the west of Scotland coming from Romano – British stock. Captured by pirates he spent his youth as a slave in Ireland looking after pigs and managed to escape to mainland Britain. A dream called him back to Ireland, where he spent the rest of his life as an evangelist. He is represented on the Union Jack by the thin diagonal stripe in the middle of Andrew's much broader white cross. David, the only truly native patron saint was born in Pembrokeshire; ironically he is the only one of the quartet not represented on the Union Jack. All of us who have spent time on Lindisfarne will recall the awesome sunrises and sunsets (see Prof. Sid Bradley for details of the 2017 Kirkdale Pilgrimage to Lindisfarne); not everyone will be necessarily familiar with Billy Bragg's alternative national anthem, *Take Down the Union Jack, It Clashes with the Sunset* which highlights the fact that we don't have a patron saint for the whole country. St Aidan would be an exemplary candidate. Aidan came from Ireland, spent many years as a monk in Scotland and in 635 AD was summoned to Northumbria where he became the abbot and bishop of Lindisfarne. He was respected for reproofing and challenging those with wealth and authority who abused their power. He was a model of Christian humility, gentleness and wisdom, who nurtured the gifts of all to promote and nurture good community. We celebrate his life and witness on 31st August. SB.

**ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING**

The two Church Wardens, the Treasurer, and all officers of the church were re-elected to serve for another year, and this announcement gives us the chance to thank them for all that they do to keep the church and churchyard in such good order, year after year. We also thank all those who regularly clean the church and arrange the flowers so beautifully, and Roger Hammon and Sue Elphinstone who wind the clock and raise the flag of St George whenever it is appropriate to do so, and Clang Deedes who gardens the two beds leading to the porch.

**THE CHURCH and CHURCHYARD**

A bit of damp has been detected in the North wall of the vestry, and we now have the Archdeacon's approval to look for, and correct, the cause, which is likely to be in the roof gutter above the vestry. You may see some scaffolding in the summer, therefore, and hopefully, a major reconstruction will not be required. The North wall of the churchyard had become very dilapidated, and has now been rebuilt and looks good. The PCC is very grateful to the all those who donated additional stone to replace those that had deteriorated beyond reuse. For six or seven years, we have been trying to establish wild flowers as naturally as possible in the unmown area at the East end of the church. This year, we really think that at last nature has taken hold and every variety is increasing, so do go and see for yourself how good it looks. In the porch last year we left a long list of the varieties that could be found growing, but someone has pinched it, and also the broom used to sweep the paths. We should be grateful for their return please!

**HISTORY OF NUNNINGTON**

Origin of the Name.  
Sometime in the 6th Century, it is thought that an Angle named Nonni arrived with his household prospecting for a good place to settle. He found just what he was looking for here, fresh water and fish in the river, timber for fires and

buildings, and open spaces for crops and grazing. So he and his family settled down by the River Rye, erected a wooden dwelling and farm buildings, drained and fenced an "ing" (meadow) for his livestock, which became known as "Nonni's Ing". Other buildings and dwellings were erected for his workers and servants, and soon a "tun" or hamlet took shape, mentioned in the Domesday Book as NONNINGTUNE. Some may think that the name derives from the fact that there may have been a Nunnery here, but there is little substantive evidence for that until 1619, when Roger Dodsworth, an antiquarian, wrote: "Nunnington hath been a nunnery, and is said to have been suppressed long since for incontinency, Sir Thomas Norcliffe (who lived in the Hall) thinketh about 400 years ago." Therefore much later than the story of Nonni's arrival.

Christianity reached Britain while the Roman legions still occupied the country. It is thought, that perhaps in the 10th Century, a Priest of Stonegrave, desiring to do something for his flock at Nunnington, set up a Cross at the present site of the church, to mark a burying place, and to be the centre of worship until a church could be built. However, in 1069, when William the Conqueror ordered his soldiers to put to fire and sword the whole of the resisting North, we know that Nunnington was laid waste – the Domesday Book says so, but Stonegrave escaped. The Normans particularly destroyed Bound Dragon Crosses, such as this, thinking them connected with Devil Worship. Hence the fragments still kept in the Vestry. (See Outlook Aug/Sep 2016) Apparently William later regretted his devastation of the North, a blot on his name which haunted him on his deathbed. "How cruelly did I burn and plunder the land; what thousands, old and young, of that noble nation did I slay!" There is also a record of a hamlet in the parish of Nunnington called Ricolf, said to have stood where the road from Nunnington going North crosses the Riccal river. It is mentioned in the Domesday Book as belonging to the King, but the Crown later granted it to Lord Robert de Roos, who in 1285 granted it to Sir John de Stonegrave for 2lbs of pepper a year and a 6th part of a "Knight's Service." It is mentioned in 1301 and again in 1334, when it contained five farms. After that, there is no further record, and it is suggested that the Black Death of 1349 accounted for its disappearance.

### **A note from the past....** From a Deanery Newsletter dated June 1927: HAROME

Pillows for Leeds Infirmary – as a result of the feathers collected at farms in the neighbourhood, 64 pillows were made up and dispatched to Leeds by Mrs Hay, who wishes to express her warmest thanks to all who so kindly helped.

The Sale of Work at the Vicarage in aid of Church Funds is now definitely fixed for Wednesday, June 15th, and Mrs R.A. Hay has very kindly consented to open the sale at 3 o'clock. We shall all hope for a fine day and that there will be plenty of buyers and well- filled stalls. All those helping I understand will be in fancy dress, though I trust an exception to this rule will be made in favour of the Vicar.

Admission will be 3d, tea 9d (children 4d). Included in the stalls will be: miscellaneous, pound, refreshment, new, jumble, farm, produce, sweets, a cake, bran tub, pig competition, hidden treasure and various devices for raising a laugh, and – incidentally – 'raising the wind'. So please help us with a goodwill and show what Harome are prepared to do for their Church.

Minster Pilgrimage – A special train will be run on Thursday June 30th, in connection with the above, though I regret the train cannot be stopped at Harome Sidings for the benefit who might want to go from this parish.
