

November is the particular month in which Christians remember those who have died. On November 2nd there is the Commemoration of All Souls, a special day of prayer for the dead, and across the benefice our services at that time will especially remember those who have died locally in the preceding year and of our loved ones. Remembrance Sunday falls on 12th November this year, the day when those who have fallen in war are once more brought to mind. It is important and a comfort to recall those who have died.

When someone we love dies, our feelings can be confused. Besides the sense of sorrow, pain and loss, there can be guilt that, in spite of our love for the person whose life has ended, we have not treated them as well as we should. The journalist Jeff Randall wrote with painful honesty about his sense of remorse when his mother died. Because of her good health he had not seen her for a month. He has described his distorted priorities: 'Illusions of urgent demands – career, status, approval – were given immediate attention. By contrast precious, unrepeatable moments with loved ones were squandered.' While managing to do so much on television and for newspapers, he asked, why could he not 'find thirty minutes for a cup of tea' with his mother? And he answers his own question 'well, apparently, I was too busy'.

His unforgiving self-analysis will no doubt strike a chord with many of us. He is trying to change. He speaks of living now in the moment and using his time as best he can, thinking how to use it and with whom to share it. Perhaps he may be being harder on himself than he needs to be, but if he manages to live like that, what a wonderful final gift his mother has left him. Jeff Randall's experience of remembering his mother prompts us to reflect on how we should value and care for those who are living. The Christian belief that at death life is changed, not ended, is not offering us a dispensation from the same care. The Apostles' encounter with the risen Jesus after his death on the Cross, Jesus not resuscitated, Jesus not revived and waiting to die again, but Jesus who has passed from this earthly life to eternal life, was a revelation about human life and human destiny beyond 'the pettiness of time'. However, that awareness of life after death is not an invitation to indifference to life before death. One way of using this November could be to ask, 'who am I forgetting?' Who do I know who is

perhaps elderly, or unwell, or housebound, or in hospital, or in a care home, someone who I have not seen for too long, perhaps someone to whom I owe much, but whom someone to whom I owe much, but whom somehow I never seem to find time to visit, perhaps someone who would value that visit more than I could imagine or suppose.

Those who may die soon need our care, and who would wish to be found wanting. The Irish Dominican Paul Murray has a poem in his early collection, *The Absent Fountain*. He writes first of all of the dead: In their rites of passage

*In their crossings,  
The dead - like us –  
Need love, need courage;  
Let us pray for the dead.*

And then he goes on to comfort the living, those who care supplies that need;

*And remember, remember  
Those who have been grazed  
By the tip of death's wing  
And feel the heart naked.  
Let us pray for the living.*



## **St Gregory's Minster Kirkdale** **Patronal Festival**




On Sunday 3 September we celebrated our Patronal Festival in a manner that was truly worthy of the occasion.

The Friends of St Gregory's Minster had invited Francis Jackson to be their guest, both at the service and at the celebratory lunch afterwards. Philip Moore came to play the organ so the music for the occasion centred round these two previous Masters of the Music of York Minster.

The service began with the Kirkdale Introit Non enim pro loco res which Philip Moore wrote for us last year and which had its first performance in September 2016. The Gradual Anthem Order our days in thy peace by Francis Jackson was written over twenty years earlier, dedicated to Leslie Mathews and the choir of St Gregory's Minster and was receiving its first performance for a while. In both pieces the words are attributed to Gregory the Great. To this heady mix we added the setting of the Communion Service which Francis wrote in 1949 and dedicated to the Choir of York Minster. During the administration, we sang two unaccompanied pieces by Edward Bairstow, the Organist at York before Francis Jackson, and finished with a tiny piece of Bach, arranged by Francis, set to words by Dean Eric Milner-White, the man who appointed Francis to succeed Bairstow in 1946.

As well as celebrating our Patron in fine style we celebrated over a hundred years of music from York and, in particular, paid honour to Francis Jackson in his hundredth year.

receive the benefit of the Rectory income, sufficient to satisfy the money-lenders, provided that he paid a priest to do the work, because, of course, he was not of Holy Orders. Richard de Clifford had been appointed Priest just six weeks earlier, but was not in agreement with this arrangement, and Archbishop Giffard of York got to hear about it, and excommunicated John for “seizing the issues of Stonegrave Church.” This effectively meant that John could not receive the Holy Sacrament for a period, but unperturbed, he continued to be troublesome, (a typical teenager?) and the sentence was repeated, until in 1269, two years later, the Archbishop pronounced against him the Greater Excommunication “for entering forcibly upon the Church of Stonegrave whilst excommunicated.” This sentence was severe, for it meant that John should be cut off from the church altogether, without hope, even, of a Christian burial, a terrifying prospect. This was too much for John, so he made his “submission” to the Archbishop on June 14th 1269, and a bond was made with sureties that the submission would be observed.

In 1270, John became of age, and entered into possession of his manors and patronage, replaced Richard de Clifford with Thomas de Birland, an act done not without some difficulty, but now was able to turn his attention to the management of his extensive estates not only here in Nunnington, Ness and Stonegrave, but also in Essex, Bedford and Lincolnshire, some of which came to him through his new young wife, Ida, an heiress in her own right. However, he still had hanging over him the threat of litigation from the money-lenders of York, to repay in full his brothers’ debts.

## Funeral

The funeral of Patrick Till took place at the end of July, and Bridget, Rosie and Patrick's extended family was very well supported by friends from all over the country. He had lived in the East and North Ridings all his life, and worked locally as a highly respected solicitor, being a great help to many of us. A true countryman, his abiding passions were his hounds, his dogs and his horses, and he could be seen regularly exercising all of them, as well as looking after the dogs of others from time to time. The Till family came to live in Nunnington fairly recently, although Bridget was born here, and during that time entered into supporting the village and the church in any way they could becoming respectively, Treasurer and Secretary of the PCC, and often reading the lesson in services. A strong character, we shall all miss him.

## Church Concert

Earlier in July, Kirkbymoorside Community Band gave us a wonderful concert in the church, playing a variety of well-known and lesser known music, which really was appreciated by the congregation that filled the building. The solution he reached was to appoint John as Rector of Stonegrave, so that he could
