Dear Friends,

A warm welcome to our Mid-Summer Edition of Outlook which opens with the Feast Day of the Transfiguration which this year falls on the first Sunday of August. The story is retold of Jesus on top of a mountain, appearing to his disciples in dazzling glory, showing them signs of extraordinary things to come in his life and death and in the world after his rising from death. The promises and the hope were unmistakable, for us all to know, grasp, celebrate and rely on. The Gospel of the Transfiguration is read on 6th August, when the Church, world-wide, focuses on the revelation of the radiant heavenly glory of Christ, a feast ironically nuanced by also being Hiroshima Day with its contrasting radiance of the destructive power of the atomic bomb, and the last Sunday before Lent, when it is the culmination of the of the revelation of the revelation of Christ that began at Epiphany. It also occurs in the daily lectionary as part of our journeys though the Gospels; each time we encounter it differently.

Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by (1 Kings 19.11)

Elijah's experience of God was breath taking, not in its power but in its gentleness. He wasn't to be found in wind, earthquake or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence. We often expect to find God in spectacular events, when worship is electric and spines are tingling, but God very often sneaks up on us in silence, in guiet places, in the smile of a child or the shape of a leaf. The world can't cope with displays of power. At the Transfiguration, Peter couldn't cope with the disclosure of Christ's divinity and wanted to box it in. After the first atomic explosion at Hiroshima no nation has been able to cope with the enormity of such horrific power as was released that day. Both Elijah's and Jesus's experiences encourages us not to look for God so much in spectacular demonstrations of power but in quiet encounters on mountainsides; when the veil is drawn back and we glimpse the aching depth of the divine in our midst. God is fully present today in the warp and wept of our lives. I believe we also see the divine in our midst in the life and example of others and at this time as we mark the recent death of our beloved Margaret Timbrell, Benefice Lay Reader, I know so many of us were acutely aware of her precious gift of drawing us in to God's presence through her gentleness, kindness and faithfulness. The Nunnington Page

includes a lovely account of Margaret's remarkable life – and do call into Nunnington Church and see the Book of Photographs and Memories of Max and Margaret put together by Nunnington Parishioners – such happy memories of fun, hospitality and adventures and Margaret's Lucy Atwood's rosy cheeks.

This Edition comes out when many of us are enjoying holiday time and catch-up with friends and family. During August the Choir at St Gregory's is taking a well- earned breather- their wonderful singing sustained us through the pandemic lockdowns. Services at St Gregory's will continue – but with hymns only – but the Choir will be back for the St Gregory's Patronal Festival on Sunday 3rd September. I am delighted to report that Erica Dineen was able to attend a service at Windsor to see her son John receive an OBE from the Princess Royal, HRH Princess Anne. At the Patronal Festival we will be blessing a new white and gold Altar Frontal commissioned by Erica and the Family to remember Mike, Erica's beloved husband. As summer comes quickly, early harvests are being made and the endless cycle of work on the land continues across the parish, keeping our farmers well and truly busy. The delightful sight of new born lambs again brought a smile to our faces and reminds us of the regeneration all around. Pockley never stands still and as we move into summer we can look forward to the annual village BBQ (15 July) and a new event this year, a Sunday Curry Lunch on Sunday 27th August (book early as this is proving to be popular) and our annual Fish and Chip supper will be held on Saturday 25th November. August is often the warmest month of the year, kicking off with Lammas tide, the ancient marking of the beginning of harvest in the UK, or if you live locally Yorkshire Day. Either way it's an opportunity to celebrate, relax, bask in the warmth, to holiday. Either to take a package tour to even warmer climes or possibly to load your entire family (and what feels like all your possessions) into a car and head off to a tourist destination with the rest of the population. This year, in August the Messy Church team are using the theme of picnics to gather round God's word with local families, telling the story of the feeding of the 5000 and enjoying a picnic meal together. The 34th Annual General Meeting of "The Friends of St Gregory's Minster, Kirkdale" was held on Saturday 20th May 2023. Mr Tim Ramsdale was elected and welcomed to the Board of Trustees, bringing the number up to nine, out of a Constitutionally permitted ten. Professor Sid Bradley and Dr Philip Moore were presented to the membership in attendance, and were accepted and welcomed as Patrons.

I am very happy to announce that the Parish Architect presented two applications for Faculties to the Diocese on 26th May, relating to conservation work to be undertaken within the Minster. These applications were accepted, and the outcome (following the usual research by the Diocese) is expected after this research is complete in a few weeks' time. This is standard procedure and was expected. The Trustees and the JCC are hopeful that work will begin in the autumn, on the tomb-covers, and in the spring, on the windows. On behalf of the Trustees and Friends, I must, as ever, express gratitude for the easy and productive relationship between the Trustees and the JCC.

Another source of great pleasure is that publication of the Kirkdale Monographs has resumed, the latest publication being "Lord Danby's Phisicke Garden" by Professor Sid Bradley. This is a fascinating account of the relationship between Lord Danby, St Gregory's Minster and the University of Oxford. I am delighted to say that this Monograph is achieving good sales, and I am even more delighted to say, that thanks to the efforts of James and Farrell (Trustees) all the Monograph titles can now be viewed and purchased on-line.

The apparatus looks spankingly new and very expensive. The voice inside speaks in Greek, then the techies press the 'English' button. "Breathe in and hold your breath"

Back in the ward, the hours tick by. Two old men are dying, and in Greece, relatives are expected to provide much of the personal care. One old lady sleeps all night on a sun lounger; the other makes do with a hard chair. The ladies wash their underwear in the washroom and leave it to dry, so there's nowhere to hang my stuff when I go in. There is no toilet seat.

But I'm getting ahead of myself. I was hospitalised on day one. Drips'n'drains and tubestubes tubes. When you turn over at night you have to make sure you take your tubes with you.

My world shrank to just those things I could control: up & down buttons, the bottle of water, and the wonderful, the marvellous, internet. I listened to stories, news, Morning and Evening Prayer, allowing my mind to keep ticking over.

7am Watched one of the old ladies holding open a book and standing over her unconscious husband. She finished her prayers with the sign of the cross made at least six times. Then she repeated the action with the book over his head. On the wall an icon keeps watch over us all.

The staff are under great pressure. I like the chief who sits to speak to me. I do not like one with the ponytail who smoked (smoked!!!) during the relatives' consultation.

I can see that, if resources are tight, (and Greece is not a wealthy country) money will be spent on staff and technical equipment rather than patient comfort. But every bed has long slits in the plastic covering which exposes the stuffing. I wished I were in an NHS hospital.

My wife Sue comes twice a day and we anxiously exchange news gleaned from the doctors. Finally, I am discharged after 18 days 'inside'

I cannot praise airport 'special assistance' too highly. Corfu airport (run by the Germans) is a model of efficiency.

OUR DEAREST MARGARET TIMBRELL

Giver of love and care throughout her life, wherever she might be, and with whom she met: a humble person with the greatness of a life, no better lived, strong in her Christian faith and her dedication to the Church.

Born: 20th February 1939 Died: 26th June 2023

Margaret was born in Cheshire and trained as a nurse at the Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford and then as a mid-wife in Manchester.

For nine years she ran a small mission hospital in South-west Africa (now Namibia), for the Society of Partners in Gospel.

Whilst there, her leave to travel home was once every three years, travelling back and forth by ship. Such long absences from home with no telephone or post; a tough challenge.

In 1974 she arrived in Nunnington as the District Nurse. The village was smaller then, with fewer houses and small shops; quintessentially a farming and rural community. She is still remembered for her nursing care and for bringing so many babies into the world of Nunnington.

A new vicar arrived, John Bateman, and on his first Sunday he was unwell and unable to take the service at Stonegrave, then part of the Parish of Nunnington. It seemed the presence of a friend, an Australian visiting priest (part of the Anglican Order of Bush Brothers), could stand in at the service and this would change Margaret's life! Margaret was asked to support this visiting priest, Max, at the service making him welcome and ensuring he knew the 'ways 'of North Yorkshire. What joy, as this was the start of a wonderful loving relationship and a marriage in Nunnington Church in 1979, shortly after, leaving for Australia where Max was to become a Parish Priest.

Max and Margaret returned to Nunnington in 1983 and Max was appointed vicar of Ingleby Greenhow, Kildale, Bilsdale and Westerdale. This was a treasured time for Margaret and Max who both loved the open space of the moors and the wonderful people in their Parish; what tales of wind and rain and snow, a tenacious and determined couple, always true to their mission in life.

In 1996 Max 'retired' and he and Margaret made a welcome return to Nunnington, making a home at Jasmine Cottage, becoming pivotal in the Church and village community. This included Margaret introducing the Nunnington News and becoming the village postmistress from Jasmine Cottage! Their life was full, not least by a series of dogs which they loved dearly.

As Max passed away, Margaret continued to be a Lay Reader and so much more in the Church, never ceasing to give her time and love to us in good times and when times were difficult.

In August 2020 Margaret moved to Dulverton Hall, a retirement home for members of the clergy where she found a gentle but rewarding lifestyle before moving into care. Margaret remained peaceful and tranquil, maintaining her special smile during her last weeks as she prepared for her heavenly journey and eternal rest.

Every one of us will miss Margaret, as we loved her dearly, but her legacy remains within the people who knew her and in the community she left behind.
